Health & Safety Training

What do I need to know about the Health and Safety Training market?

The following summary statistics have been taken from market research reports and reliable resources that the Information Service uses to compile industry information. They should give you an indication of how your industry is faring at present and whether there is demand for your type of business:

- In 2021, the UK market for occupational health provision increased in value by an estimated 3% to £1.06 billion. According to MBD that market value will grow by a cumulative 11%, or £120 million, between 2022 and 2026, with Outsourced Service providers accounting for £681million by 2026, In-House Corporate provision reaching £327million and the NHS £190million. (Mintel, Occupational Health UK, May 2022).
- In 2019-20, 38.8 million working days were lost thanks to work-related ill health and non-fatal workplace injuries, though this fell to 36.8 million in 2021-22. Over the five years through 2028-29, occupational health & safety services industry revenue is forecast to climb at a compound annual rate of 0.8% to reach £1.8 billion. Compliance Assistance is estimated to account for the largest share of industry revenue in 2024, at £565.1million (33.5%). Health & Safety Training is expected to account for £251.3million (14.9%). - ◆ The latest report from Health & Safety Executive UK for Scotland reported that 136,000 workers in Scotland suffer from work-related ill health annually, 59% of which are due to stress, depression, or anxiety. Musculoskeletal disorders represent 24%, and there are 40,000 non-fatal injuries each year. Notably, Scotland's workplace fatality rate is higher than Great Britain's, with 26 deaths in 2022/23. The costs of Scotlish workplace injuries and ill health amounted to £1.9 billion in 2022-23. (HSE, Workplace health and safety statistics for Scotland, 2023).
- According to the Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (IOSH) 2022-23 Annual Report, 'the adoption by the International Labour Organization of a safe and healthy working environment as a fundamental principle and right at work means that OSH professionals will become progressively more important in corporate accountability and strategic thinking.' IOSH stated that over 900 000 delegates trained on IOSH courses in 2022-23. (IOSH , Getting the Fundamentals Right: IOSH Group Annual Report and Accounts, 2022-23).(www.iosh.com).
- The national organisations for this industry are The Institute of Occupational Safety and Health, Health and Safety Executive Scotland and the British Safety Equipment Association, The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents the British Safety Council and the European Agency for Safety and Health at Work.

- Mintel Occupational Health UK (May 2022). With more people now working remotely, OH professionals must ensure that they adapt their services to fit these new working trends. Visits to an office or headquarters are no longer as viable as previously, since fewer employees may be on-site, and therefore the employee drive for virtual health consultations should be met by an increase in the supply of such services. The greater move to hybrid working patterns has also increased the importance of workspace ergonomics. Without proper ergonomics, workers can suffer back, neck, wrist, and pelvic pain.
- ♦ IBISWorld Occupational Health & Safety Services in the UK (December 2023). Despite economic disruptions, the reduction in unemployment has meant many new staff have required training. From October 2015, self-employed individuals whose work poses no potential risk to other workers' or public members' health and safety were exempted from health and safety regulations, which has dampened some aspects of industry demand, but a clear trend in decreasing unemployment until 2022 aided demand for OH services as rising employment levels boost the need for health and safety training sessions.
- ♦ IBISWorld Corporate Wellness Services in the UK (August 2023). The corporate wellness industry has rebounded after the pandemic, with an anticipated 3.0% growth rate in 2023-24, however, poor economic conditions, including high inflation in the two years through 2023-24, have caused businesses to cut their spending budgets, reducing industry demand. Higher levels of health consciousness, recovering unemployment levels, efforts by businesses to enhance productivity by reducing the costs of poor health, and growth in the online delivery of industry services will boost demand. Britain's ageing workforce and greater emphasis on tacking mental health problems will aid growth.

- ♦ <u>UK Government Employer Skills Survey 2022</u> reported that "Three-fifths (60%) of employers had provided training for their staff in the last 12 months, a decrease from 66% in 2017. Half of all employers (49%) provided on-the-job training (down from 53% in 2017) and 39% provided off-the-job training (down from 48% in 2017). The average investment in training per employee was £1,780, compared to £2,010 in 2017 (accounting for inflation)."

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How can I find out about my competitors?

Once you've identified who your competitors are, the next step is to gather information on the way they do business. Which services do they provide? How do they market themselves? How much do they charge?

To learn about your competitors:

- Look for articles or adverts in local newspapers, trade press and directories.
- Try to read their marketing material; if the company has an online presence, visit the company's website as a first port of call. Not only does it give you a better understanding of the company's activities, it can also offer a wealth of information such as a company history or staff biographies, as well as the company's partners or suppliers
- Search for information on limited UK companies via the <u>Companies House</u> website
- Gain an insight into your competitor's performance using credit checks and the accounts that limited companies are required to submit to Companies House each year.

- Understanding Scottish Places has interactive profiles of towns and cities across Scotland. It can be useful for understanding the interrelationships and flows between towns, and also gives comparisons between two or more places.
- <u>Scottish Government Statistics</u> provide accurate and up-to-date statistics on Scotland, covering population, health, education and housing. Publications are also available at <u>Statistics and Research</u>.
- ♦ <u>The Scottish Household Survey</u> provides information on the structure, characteristics, attitudes and behaviour of Scottish households, both at a national and local level.
- Office for National Statistics (ONS) is the recognised national statistical body for the UK. ONS covers a
 wide range of demographic, economic and social issues at a UK level.
