What do I need to know about the Property Development and Maintenance market?

The following summary statistics have been taken from market research reports and reliable resources that the Information Service uses to compile industry information. They should give you an indication of how your industry is faring at present and whether there is demand for your type of business:

- Property management services revenue benefitted from improvements in the rented residential property market in the years leading up to the COVID-19 outbreak, caused by rising UK house prices, which priced out potential homebuyers. Demand from non-residential properties rose due to an expanding number of businesses in the UK requiring industry-managed office space. Revenue is expected to grow at a compound annual rate of 1.1% over the five years through 2022-23 to £32.7 billion, including growth of 4.1% in 2022-23. (IBISWorld, Property Management Services in the UK, March 2023).
- Repairs and Maintenance are estimated to account for 22.8% of £17.7bn industry revenue in the current year, making this the second largest service segment in the industry. Providers of both public- and private-sector services depend upon well-maintained buildings to efficiently conduct business. Therefore, repairs and continuous upkeep of buildings are of utmost importance to clients. Demand for repairs and maintenance services has increased over the past five years. (IBISWorld, *Combined Facilities Support Activities in the UK*, June 2022).
- Repair, renovation and remodelling work on existing residential properties is estimated to account for 28.7% of £80.6bn industry revenue in 2022-23. A large number of small-scale contractors specialise in repair, renovation and remodelling work on existing residential properties. Record low interest rates, policy support and increased savings spurred a surge in house prices during the pandemic, encouraging households who had been forced to spend more time at home to invest in home improvements. The cost-of-living crisis, coupled with falling house prices have increasingly limited works to essential repairs. (IBISWorld, *Residential Building Construction in the UK*, July 2023).
- Building project developers' revenue is forecast to decrease at a compound annual rate of 4.2% to £34.9 billion over the five years through 2023-24, inclusive of a 1.2% contraction in the current year, when the average industry profit margin is anticipated to be 27.2%. National House Building Council (NHBC) reported a 23.2% drop in the number of homes registered to be built in the UK in 2020. Landsec and British Land reported declines in their portfolio valuations of 13.7% and 10.8% respectively in 2020-21. (IBISWorld Building Project Development in the UK, July 2023).
- The national organisation for this industry is the <u>Scottish Building Federation</u>. Other industry bodies include <u>Built Environment Smarter Transformation</u> (formerly Construction Scotland), the <u>Federation of Master Builders</u>, the <u>Scottish Property Federation</u>, <u>Construction Industry Training</u> <u>Board</u>, <u>Property Managers Association Scotland</u>. and the <u>Construction Industry Council</u>.

- IBISWorld Commercial Property Remodelling in the UK (October 2022). Looking beyond 2021-22 and considering the extent to which the economy has already suffered, there is likely to be some lingering operating challenges and market uncertainties that contractors will need to contend with. Regarding the latter, the nature of the UK market's adjustment to its independence from the EU bloc, and the bearing this will have on activity in commercial property investment markets, also remains a relative unknown, as pandemic-related issues have overshadowed the economy of late.
- Mintel, Construction UK, (2023). New construction is the sector most widely seen to be highly volatile and repeatedly demonstrating annual changes in excess of the wider GDP development because so much of the investment is based on confidence (primarily business confidence as opposed to consumer confidence) in the future and includes some speculative construction activity. In 2022, new construction accounted for 62% of the total market, so its influence is strong in the overall market development.
- Mintel Commercial Property in the UK (2022). Industrial property has been the strongest-performing sector of the commercial property market over the past five years and now represents the largest single sector. In 2021 alone, the capital value of the industrial sector grew by a significant 31% to £372 million, accounting for 36% of the total commercial property stock.

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How can I find out about my competitors?

To learn about your competitors:

- Look for articles or adverts in local newspapers, trade press and directories.
- Try to read their marketing material; if the company has an online presence, visit the company's website as a first port of call. Not only does it give you a better understanding of the company's activities, it can also offer a wealth of information such as a company history or staff biographies, as well as the company's partners or suppliers
- Search for information on limited UK companies via the Companies House website
- Gain an insight into your competitor's performance using credit checks and the accounts that limited companies are required to submit to Companies House each year.

- <u>Understanding Scottish Places</u> has interactive profiles of towns and cities across Scotland. It can be useful for understanding the interrelationships and flows between towns, and also gives comparisons between two or more places.
- <u>Scottish Government Statistics</u> provide accurate and up-to-date statistics on Scotland, covering population, health, education and housing.
- The Scottish Household Survey provides information on the structure, characteristics, attitudes and behaviour of Scottish households, both at a national and local level.
- Office for National Statistics (ONS) is the recognised national statistical body for the UK. ONS covers a wide range of demographic, economic and social issues at a UK level.
