What do I need to know about the Restaurant, Café and Coffee Shop market?

The following summary statistics have been taken from market research reports and reliable resources that the Information Service uses to compile industry information. They should give you an indication of how your industry is faring at present and whether there is demand for your type of business:

- The industry has experienced a decline in revenue over the past five years, with a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of -3.4% from 2020 to 2025. This decline has been attributed to several factors, including a decrease in profit margins and significant operational challenges, such as rising energy and labour costs. Despite these challenges, the number of businesses has increased annually by 1.2% during the same period, indicating some resilience and adaptability among smaller and independent cafes that are capitalizing on consumer demands for sustainability and quality. (IBISWorld, Cafés and Coffee Shops in the UK, April 2025)
- ♦ Foodservice value sales increase by 6% in current terms in 2024 to GBP18.5 billion. Outlet numbers grow by 0.4% to 58,573 in the same year. Juice/smoothie bars is the best performing category in 2024, with foodservice value sales increasing by 14% in current terms to GBP107 million. Foodservice value sales are set to grow at a current value CAGR of 3% (2024 constant value CAGR of 1%) over the forecast period to GBP21.3 billion. The number of outlets is expected to increase at a CAGR of 1% to 60,648 over the same period. (Euromonitor, Cafés/Bars in the UK, February 2025)
- ↑ The outlook for the restaurant industry from 2025 to 2030 is positive but comes with some challenges. Revenue is expected to **grow at a compound annual rate of 3.5%**, driven by increasing consumer demand for dining out. However, the industry will continue to grapple with labour shortages and rising wages, which are of significant concern. Restaurants will likely focus on innovation and technology to enhance customer experiences and operational efficiency, while sustainability and local sourcing will become even more critical. Social media will remain a key marketing tool to attract and retain customers, along with promotions and loyalty schemes. (IBISWorld, *Full-Service Restaurants in the UK*, April 2025).
- Over half of UK foodservice consumers and nearly two thirds of those over 45 prioritise high-quality food, creating a chance to win older diners with premium ingredients and well-prepared dishes. Younger diners aged 16-44 focus on affordability, with 52% valuing deals like 2-for-1 offers. Additionally, 32% of foodservice consumers and 48% of 16-34 year olds have redeemed restaurant app rewards in the past six months, underscoring their importance. Balancing the needs of quality-focused older diners and budget-conscious younger ones will be key to success. (Mintel, Eating Out UK, January 2025).
- ◆ The national organisation for this industry is <u>UK Hospitality</u>. Other industry bodies include <u>The British</u>

- ▶ IBISWorld Café and Coffee Shops in the UK (April 2025). The most popular product in this segment is coffee, which represents a £3.6 billion market. Britons now drink around 98 million cups of coffee a day, with younger generations leading the shift in preference from tea to coffee. Additionally, there is a rising demand for artisan and specialty coffee options, with consumers willing to pay more for premium products. Besides coffee, cafes are also diversifying their beverage menus to include water, carbonated drinks, juices, teas, and hot chocolate. Health-marked drinks like kombucha and low-sugar varieties are gaining popularity due to increasing health awareness among consumers.
- ♦ IBISWorld Restaurants and Takeaways in the UK (June 2025). There are opportunities for businesses that can develop strong customer loyalty, adapt quickly to healthier food trends, and maintain competitive pricing. Additionally, the industry has very low barriers to entry, allowing new businesses to enter the market easily.
- ♦ Statista Restaurants in the United Kingdom (February 2025). This report presents a selection of statistics and facts about the restaurant industry in the United Kingdom. It provides an overview of the UK food service market, plus data on restaurant revenue, leading restaurant chains, and consumer behaviour. It also includes a spotlight chapter on employment in hospitality.

It is worth around £15 billion each year and accounts for one in five manufacturing jobs. Scotland has 18,850 food and drink businesses, which employ around 115,400 people.
- ♦ <u>Visit Scotland Food and Drink Tourism</u>. This page explores the food and drink experiences of visitors to Scotland. Food and drink are a key part of a visit to Scotland, almost half (46%) of visitors participated in at least one food and drink experience whilst on their trip, rising to 62% for long haul visitors.
- COBRA Reports, Accessed from <u>National Library of Scotland</u>. Have several Business Opportunity Profiles on a range of food service industries including Café/Snack Bar, Tea Room, Coffee Shop, Cat Cafe, Board Game Café and Restaurant. These include key market issues and trends, trading, commercial and legal issues and legislation.

How can I find out about my competitors?

Immediate competition will be from other businesses in your local area. There are several online directories which can be used to find company information and generate lists easily and at no expense. Many Local Authorities also publish local business directories on the web. Below are some key web resources:

- General business directories such as <u>Yell</u>, <u>Thomson Local</u> or <u>Google Maps</u>
- Trade specialists like <u>EuroPages</u> (European directory), <u>The Wholesaler</u> or <u>Free Index</u>
- Business to business (B2B) specialists such as <u>Kompass</u>

Likewise, your local Chamber of Commerce may publish a members' directory; find your local Chamber on the Scottish Chambers website.

Once you've identified who your competitors are, the next step is to gather information on the way they do business. Which services do they provide? How do they market themselves? How much do they charge?

To learn about your competitors:

- Look for articles or adverts in local newspapers, trade press and directories.
- Try to read their marketing material; if the company has an online presence, visit the company's website as a first port of call. Not only does it give you a better understanding of the company's activities, it can also offer a wealth of information such as a company history or staff biographies, as well as the company's partners or suppliers
- Search for information on limited UK companies via the <u>Companies House</u> website
- Gain an insight into your competitor's performance using credit checks and the accounts that limited companies are required to submit to Companies House each year.

- ◆ Information from the most recent census in 2011 is released via the official website. See in particular the Census Area Profiles. Clicking on your area of interest will give the latest population figures, including estimates by age.
- ♦ <u>Understanding Scottish Places</u> has interactive profiles of towns and cities across Scotland. It can be useful for understanding the interrelationships and flows between towns, and also gives comparisons between two or more places.
- <u>Scottish Government Statistics</u> provide accurate and up-to-date statistics on Scotland, covering population, health, education and housing.
- ♦ <u>The Scottish Household Survey</u> provides information on the structure, characteristics, attitudes and behaviour of Scottish households, both at a national and local level.
- Office for National Statistics (ONS) is the recognised national statistical body for the UK. ONS covers a
 wide range of demographic, economic and social issues at a UK level.
