

Window Cleaning

What do I need to know about the Window Cleaning market?

The following summary statistics have been taken from market research reports and reliable resources that the Information Service uses to compile industry information. They should give you an indication of how your industry is faring at present and whether there is demand for your type of business:

- Industry revenue is forecast to grow at a compound annual rate of 5.9% over the five years through 2022-23 to reach £301.8 million, and experience further growth at 4.8% over the five years through 2027-28 to reach £381 million. Revenue growth has been pushed by a steady stream of demand from residential clients and commercial enterprises, but the industry's average profit margin is expected to drop to 10.7% in difficult trading conditions. (IBISWorld, *Window Cleaning Services in the UK*, May 2023).
- The industry has benefitted from the outsourcing of cleaning services by the healthcare sector and rises in the number of UK businesses. The window cleaning sector rebounded significantly, winning back market share (25.4% £302.7million) as businesses focused on maintaining a professional look. In the UK, there were 155 completed buildings of at least 100 metres tall in June 2023, aiding industry demand. Additionally, there were a further 45 tall building under construction as of May 2023. (IBISWorld, *Industrial Cleaning Activities in the UK*, December 2023).
- Window cleaning was the largest segment of the Global Contract Cleaning Services market in 2022. Window cleaning service will be the 2nd-fastest growing segment within the overall market and will grow from \$141.21 million in 2022 to \$201.13 million in 2027. Window cleaning services are becoming more important due to increased attention to sustainability and green practices. Using eco-friendly cleaning solutions and techniques helps reduce pollution, conserve natural resources, and create a safer working environment. (Technavio, Global Contract Cleaning Services Market 2023-2027).
- The global robotic window cleaners market was valued at \$1,136.28 million in 2022 and is estimated to grow to \$3,001.76 million in 2027. Robotic window cleaners are typically more expensive than traditional manual cleaning methods or basic window cleaning tools. The advanced technology and automation involved in these devices contribute to their higher price. Factors such as heavily soiled or stained windows, irregular surfaces, or complex architectural designs can pose difficulties for robotic devices. (Technavio, *Global Robotic Window Cleaners Market* 2023-2027).
- The national organisation for this industry is the <u>Federation of Window Cleaners</u>. Other industry bodies include the <u>British Window Cleaning Academy</u>, the <u>Window Cleaners Alliance</u>, the <u>International Window Cleaning Association</u> and the <u>British Cleaning Council</u>.

- IBISWorld Window Cleaning Services in the UK (May 2023). The private organisations that use industry services are predominantly in the retail, hospitality, real estate, financial and healthcare sectors. Demand from households is influenced by trends in income. Stagnant wage growth has constrained demand in this segment. Regions with large cities have a greater number of window cleaners. Tall buildings need more specialist equipment or training. London is dominated by larger companies, as they like to target larger contracts and companies. Price competition threatens many smaller operators. Smaller window cleaning companies often try to develop personable relationships with their clients to gain repeat custom.
- Technavio Global Robotic Window Cleaners Market 2023-2027. UK was the 4th-largest country in the market in 2022 and will continue to be the 4th-largest segment in 2027. It will grow at a compounded annual growth rate of 21.27% between 2022 and 2027, which is lower than that of the overall market. Among the key countries, UK will be the slowest growing country and will grow from \$77.49 million in 2022 to \$203.22 million in 2027.

- Window Cleaning Resources (<u>www.windowcleaningresources.co.uk</u>) is an online resource for the UK's window cleaning industry. It features market news and trends, reviews of new equipment and products, and an industry directory.
- Under the Civic Government (Scotland) Act 1982, in most parts of Scotland window cleaners must apply for a licence from their local authority before starting to trade. Licences are usually issued for three years. See <u>www.gov.uk/window-cleaners-licence-scotland</u> for more details.
- National Records of Scotland (NRS), Council Area Profiles (<u>www.nrscotland.gov.uk/</u>). These profiles will tell you how many households there are in each Local Authority in Scotland. This can be useful in estimating the size of your potential residential market.
- Health and Safety Executive (HSE), Window Cleaning. This page will help you to identify the risks involved with window cleaning and choose the right equipment for the job. (www.hse.gov.uk/cleaning/topics/window-cleaning.htm).

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How can I find out about my competitors?

Business Gateway's online guide to <u>*Competitor Analysis*</u> explains how to find your competitors, how to research what they're doing and how to act on what you learn about them.

Immediate competition will be from other businesses in your local area. There are several online directories which can be used to find company information and generate lists easily and at no expense. Many Local Authorities also publish local business directories on the web. Below are some key web resources:

- General business directories such as <u>Yell</u>, <u>Thomson Local</u> or <u>Google Maps</u>
- Trade specialists like <u>EuroPages</u> (European directory), <u>The Wholesaler</u> or <u>Free Index</u>
- Business to business (B2B) specialists such as <u>Kompass</u>

Likewise, your local Chamber of Commerce may publish a members' directory; find your local Chamber on the <u>Scottish Chambers</u> website.

Once you've identified who your competitors are, the next step is to gather information on the way they do business. Which services do they provide? How do they market themselves? How much do they charge?

To learn about your competitors:

- Look for articles or adverts in local newspapers, trade press and directories.
- Try to read their marketing material; if the company has an online presence, visit the company's website as a first port of call. Not only does it give you a better understanding of the company's activities, it can also offer a wealth of information such as a company history or staff biographies, as well as the company's partners or suppliers
- Search for information on limited UK companies via the <u>Companies House</u> website
- Gain an insight into your competitor's performance using credit checks and the accounts that limited companies are required to submit to Companies House each year.

- Information from the most recent census in 2011 is released via the official website. See in particular the <u>Census Area Profiles</u>. Clicking on your area of interest will give the latest population figures, including estimates by age.
- <u>Understanding Scottish Places</u> has interactive profiles of towns and cities across Scotland. It can be useful for understanding the interrelationships and flows between towns, and also gives comparisons between two or more places.
- <u>Scottish Government Statistics</u> provide accurate and up-to-date statistics on Scotland, covering population, health, education and housing.
- The Scottish Household Survey provides information on the structure, characteristics, attitudes and behaviour of Scottish households, both at a national and local level.
- Office for National Statistics (ONS) is the recognised national statistical body for the UK. ONS covers a wide range of demographic, economic and social issues at a UK level.
